Police—Not Criminals—Handcuffed: Authorities Refuse to Prosecute "Victimless" Automotive Theft Despite Concrete Video, Physical Evidence

Indianapolis, IN and Hanover, MD: A recent test drive theft at a car dealership in Indianapolis, Indiana quickly revealed gaping holes in prosecution of car thefts. According to dealership owner Mr. Bob Falcone, police are instructed by local prosecutors to not arrest "victimless" crimes like car thefts—despite surveillance footage from Eyewitness Surveillance offering concrete leads to the victim's identity.

On March 10, 2017, a test drive theft occurred, during which a \$32,000 Volkswagen Jetta was driven off the lot and never returned. Mr. Falcone then called Eyewitness Surveillance—his remote live video surveillance company based in Hanover, Maryland—to recover the video footage recorded from the dealership's surveillance cameras during the thief's visit, even though the theft occurred outside of regular monitoring hours. Our cameras record activity 24/7/365, with footage saved for 30 days, so retrieval was simple for the Eyewitness account management team.

Armed with Eyewitness's video footage of the car thief and the thief's photocopied identification documents, Mr. Falcone contacted the police with the evidence. While he could file a police report, Mr. Falcone told local reporters that **the police informed him that they had no longer had a vehicle theft unit**.

IMPD Chief Bryan Roach told reporters that the unit had disbanded in 2012. Vehicle theft cases are now assigned to local police districts for increased attention to individual theft cases, which were "never a major focus" for the original vehicle theft unit.

The Volkswagen Jetta was later recovered—crashed and with a tire missing—by a local police officer. The thief later stole another vehicle from a neighboring dealership and crashed this vehicle into an innocent bystander, who was hospitalized.

Ultimately, Mr. Falcone believes that it is not the police's fault they were unable to follow up on these secure leads.

"It's frustrating, sure, but you can't blame the police for doing what they were told to do," Falcone says. "They're under instructions by their prosecutors not to arrest what they're calling a 'victimless' crime, since we have insurance and no one—at the time—was hurt. [The police] are honestly frustrated at what they see as a waste of time, since they file a bunch of paperwork and still arrest the same people over and over again."
